#### 1. RELATIONSHIP OF COURSE TO OIKOS UNIVERSITY'S MISSION:

Will introduce students to the conflict of civilizing and barbarizing tendencies in modern Western European history that has shaped its civilization. Will help students reflect on competing value systems within modern Western history and engage in informed critical conversations in light of their Christian faith more effectively in the modern era.

#### 2. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will start with current events as consequences of Western history to enable students to connect and more fully understand the issues of the present from their roots in their historical past.

Students will trace the historical sequence of cause and effect back through time to see how one era gives

birth to the next. Students will analyze critical moments in modern Western civilization: the War on Terror, the U.S. bombing of Japan and the Holocaust, the Nuremburg trials at the end of World War II, the fall of Weimar Germany and rise of Nazism, the creation of nation-states after World War I and the emergence of modern secular, constitutional democracy during the 19th century after the French Revolution. Students will ask and debate questions, such as: Has modern Western history led to greater civilization or to barbarism? How do apparently civilized Western countries turn to barbarism, then become re-civilized? What does the future hold?

#### 7. INCOMPLETE COURSE POLICY:

All course work is due at the beginning of each class on the dates assigned. Students who fail to submit assignments on time will be subject to the course's late grading policy. In all other cases and unless otherwise stated by the instructor, all course work is due by 4:00 p.m. on the last day of the semester. A grade of incomplete will only be awarded to students who cannot physically complete their course work by the last day of the semester due to an avoidable situation such as a serious illness. In such cases, students must provide valid evidence of their condition. After a semester has ended it is no longer possible to request an incomplete. Incompletes will not be granted simply because of poor time management. Students who assume that an incomplete will be issued because they failed to finish their course work by the end of the semester will automatically receive a grade of F.

Incompletes must first be approved by the Academic Affairs office. To apply for an incomplete, students must fill out an incomplete-grade-request form and submit it to the office by the deadline required by Oikos University near the end of the semester. After receiving approval from the office, the student must then obtain approval from his or her instructor.

#### **8. ATTENDANCE POLICY:**

Because the class meets once a week for extended hours, it counts for a full week of classes in a regular schedule. Missing one class is the same as missing one week of the semester. This is why students must be present and on time for every class. A large part of the final grade is based on attendance and active participation in the class meetings. Attendance is taken at the beginning of every class. Students who arrive after the beginning of class must sign the "Late Sheet" near the door of the classroom when they enter. Otherwise, they will be counted as absent. There are 15 classes, one point each for full attendance and full participation, or 2 points per class for a total of 30 points toward the final grade. A student may be excused from an absence if the student submits documents to show medical appointment or other circumstance to the office administrator during the week following the absence. One absence = discussion with teacher.

Two absences = discussion with Oikos administration.

Three absences = Academic probation.

Four absences = failing grade of F.
